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
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# 370.9 mi and \$30,510

# YOUTH STORIES

Our youth have overcome difficult pasts, and these are their stories of hope and tenacity



### **ALEX'S STORY**

Alex's path to recovery has been challenging. Originally from Fort Worth, Alex was forced to live on the streets because of issues in the home that were out of his control. Alex also struggled with addiction as a way to both cope and keep himself awake to keep safe while living on the streets. But Alex had that internal drive and earned his GED and started college at the age of 16. He now has his Associates of Applied Arts and EMT certification and is on his way to becoming a paramedic so he can help others struggling with addiction. Alex has been sober since January 20, 2020 and gives back to his community by running for charity through StandUp for Kids and is continuing to find ways to help others. His message to the youth who are in a similar situation is "there is a way out, rain will come, and rain will go, keep moving forward".

### MICHELLE'S STORY

Michelle's life has been one of struggle and perseverance. Her mother was an addict, leading to her father moving their children from Oakland to Orange County. The family struggled finding a place to live. Her father's health issues, caring for her siblings, and her own struggle with mental illness and alcohol added further stress to her life. No one was looking out for Michelle until she met Denise with StandUp for Kids. As her mentor, Denise was able to provide Michelle with the resources to deal with her mental health, living situation, and many other challenges that come with living in a car. Denise has also helped Michelle focus on what she's passionate about and potential career paths and given her window to a brighter future.



# WE'RE ON THE FRONT PAGE OF THE OC REGISTER!

StandUp for Kids was mentioned in the OC Register article "Homeless young adults meet their housing match in Orange County" by Theresa Walker. The article focuses on the story of Marquis Bowen, a 24 year old who is a part of the StandUp for Kids' housing program. Bowen was able to qualify for the OC Coordinated Entry System (CES), which aims to battle homelessness in Orange County. Bowen is one of the many homeless young adults, aged 18 to 24 years old, who are known as Transitional Age Youth (TAY). Many of these kids lived in unstable households or were in the fostercare until they were 18 years old.



Bowen, like many of our youth, had a tough childhood. His father abused phencyclidine, and family members and friends died from heroin overdoses. Bowen also began to struggle with drugs when he was just 11 years old. Bowen entered drug rehabilitation in his late teens. He, however, became homeless after a recovery house kicked him out because of an insurance issue and he then relapsed while homeless on the streets. He heard about StandUp for Kids through his cousin but was initially reluctant to reach out. With StandUp for Kids' help, Bowen got sober, landed a job, and found a place to stay. Although staying clean can be a challenge, StandUp for Kids is always there to support Bowen, who now volunteers with StandUp for Kids as a mentor to other youth.

#### "I thought, 'God finally blessed you. Now, it's time to do your part."

There has recently been a national push to better respond to the TAY youth housing needs. StandUp for Kids has been one of the voices advocating for our kids. We have recently been awarded funding to support these youth with housing from several cities in Orange County through Emergency Solutions Grants. These grants originate from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). "The Orange County chapter has helped about 100 youth per year get housing with 85 percent able to cover rent on their own after they get jobs" says Justine Palmore, Executive Director of the chapter. As part of the county CES process StandUp for Kids participates in TAY match meetings where homeless youth are matched with available housing resources. With your help we continue to support our community, one youth at a time.

## SPOTLIGHT: XIOMARA OROZCO

Xiomara Orozco has proven that she is resilient and can adapt to any problem that comes her way. She was born in Acapulco, Mexico, and her family immigrated to the USA in hopes of achieving the American Dream. She is a Dreamer and a DACA recipient. Xiomara struggled with school because of the language barrier, but her 5th grade teacher helped her learn English and inspired her to help those in need. When the 2008 Recession hit, her family lost their home and became homeless, forced to live in a garage. Xiomara was forced to become a role model and parent to her younger siblings because her mom could not speak English. Her parents eventually found jobs but still struggled with their finances.

> Xiomara had a good support system and started to work at Target and go to community college. After 5 years of community college, she transferred to CSU-Fullerton to earn her Bachelor's in Child and Adolescent Development with a focus on elementary education. She considers earning her bachelor's her biggest achievement because of the struggles she faced with the language barrier and adapting to life in America.

> > Xiomara knew that she wanted to make a big impact in her community, so she applied for a job with StandUp for Kids after researching the organization. She began working at StandUp for Kids on May 29, 2019, working as the program coordinator while also meeting with youth, providing homework help, working on the entrepreneur program, and more.

> > > She was recently promoted to program supervisor, running the e-tutoring program and guiding the 'We Deliver' program which provides groceries and hygiene kits.

> > > > She has fostered relationships with the kids and volunteers through weekly group mentoring meetings where kids and volunteers can chat and play fun games. Although she gets paid, she does not consider it a job. Xiomara loves what she does and StandUp for Kids wants to spotlight her tireless efforts and love for her kids and the organization.




